Primary emphasis throughout the show is on the Air Force's contributions to America. Visitors to the theater simultaneously view five screens which cover a horizontal distance of 20 feet. Fifteen slide projectors use more than 900 visuals during the 20minute show.

Elton has a new one out, but sorry, folks, if you were hoping for some new material. The inevitable result of Elton's semi-retirement has arrived, a second volume of his "greatest hits"

Many songs are undisputedly some of John's biggest sellers, but are not necessarily of high enough standards to be considered big "hits." While "Island Girl" may have been a modestly successful song, I find it hard to believe that it's immediate succesor on the album, "Grow Some Funk of Your Own," was even of the same caliber.

However, there are some appropriate titles on the album, like "Bitch is Back" "Someone Saved My Life Tonight", "Sorry Seems to be the Hardest Word", and the only real oldie-but-goodie on the disc, "Levon".

Elton also uses this album to introduce some of his previous 45 hits into the 33% world. "Philadel-phia Freedom", "Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds", "Don't Go Breaking My Heart" (with Kiki Dee), and the Who classic, "Pinball Wizard" are featured, for the first are time, on a long playing al-

JV's blank Broncos 9-0

The Ygnacio Valley JV's bettered their record to 3-1 (not including a strike induced forfeit) as they knocked off the Northgat Broncos 9-0.

Defense was the main factor in the victory, as the offense was plagued with excessive fumbles and penalties. At the end of the first half the teams were deadlocked 0-0.

In the second half the warriors drove the ball down deep into Bronco teritory where Don Kling, '79, split the uprights with a 23 yard field goal to give YV a 3-0 lead.

The defense, headed by Roger Harvey with lltackles in the game, again locked horns with the Broncos and each team refused the other a score until in the fourth quarter Frank Larsen, '79, put the game in the bag with a 50-yard touchdown run. The point after touchdown kick was blocked, making the final score 9-0. Larsen accumulated 110 yards on the day.

The week before, against College Park, YV again proved the victor, blanking the Falcons 14-0 YV's first score came on an eight-yard pass to split end Greg D'Arrezo from quarterback Don Kling. Frank Larsen, '79, who gained 41 yards on nine carries, scored the second YV touchdown with a four-yard burst.

But the real key to the victory was again the defense, led by Bob Herbert, '79, who had eight unassisted tackles. YV's hardnosed defense has allowed only six points in four games.

Frosh split two

The Northgate Broncos bucked the YV freshman football team 28-6 last week on the YV gridiron.

Northgate lit up the board first with a whopping 15-yard scamper, then went on to lead 22-0 at half.

The game looked hopeless for YV, but in the third quarter a 30-yard pass by Doug Churchill to Russ Harris set up Churchill for ten more yards and a touchdown to make the score 28-6.

The defensive players were really on their toes the second half when fumbles were recovered by Jeff Davis, Buddy Brennan, Darrell Reed, and an interception by Jeff Wilson. Chris Cody had three sacks and Mike Huffaker had two.

In action the week before, the freshmen smashed the College Park Falcons. Doug Churchill rushed 114 yards, and Jeff Wilson 144.

Russ Harris scored four touchdowns, Churchill one, and Wilson one. Quarterback Bill Clark shared 240 passing yards and six touchdown passes with Churchill. The final score was 44-0.

Starting the school year the team didn't have a coach, so it looked pretty grim for all those hopeful competitors. But Mrs. Kim Zufall came through and started the girls to a

rewarding season.

The team has one intermediate and 16 beginning competitors, making it an average-sized team. Tami Hayes, '79, the team's only intermediate, started off on the right foot by getting an 81.5 on vault and an 8.0 on floor in their first meet against College Park. Becky Fife, '79, one of the leading beginning competitors, also achieved an 8.15 on floor-ex.
